New Vaquero by Quintana

Shooting Times magazine for January 2005 includes an article titled "**Whats New From Ruger**". In the article of interest to **Cowboy Action Shooters** is the "**New Vaquero**". For 2005, the **New Vaquero** will have a shortened cylinder frame window; a slimmer, trimmer grip frame; checkered hard-plastic grips; and an internal key-activated lock. Also, the cylinder indexes during unloading so that when you hear the click, the chambers are aligned with the ejector rod. Caliber options will be .357 and .45 Colt only. The .44 Magnum Vaquero will remain in the line with its original frame size and features. Barrel length will be 4 5/8 and 5 1/2 inches for the .357, and 4 5/8, 5 1/2 and 7 1/2 inches for the .45.

Reloading by Jonah Stark

I don't know for sure, but I would guess that many, if not most, *Cowboy Action* shooters reload their own ammunition. Manufacturer's offer the best and most varied equipment ever available for our hobby. Several offer single stage as well as progressive presses for both shotshell and metallic cartridges.

So, how does the new reloader choose what equipment to purchase? The answer is carefully and only after researching equipment and talking to experienced reloaders. Many of us have been reloading for over 40 years and have a wealth of knowledge that we are most happy to share to help the newcomer get started properly.

Do not for a minute fall for the old saying that you are reloading to save money. If you are only shooting in matches, it will take you a long time to amortize your new equipment. Besides, any money you may save is going to be consumed in more shooting. On the other hand, if you are shooting 500+ rounds a week like some of us do, yes you can shoot that amount for less money than just buying loaded ammunition.

The first item to purchase, is a good reloading manual. Get this before you buy anything else. In my opinion, the best first manual is the Lyman #48. Lyman covers both lead and jacketed bullets and many different types of powder, while many of the other manuals available cover only their jacketed bullets and their powders. This is not to say the other manuals are not good to have. Heck, I've got about 140 reloading manuals and related books on reloading and I refer to many of them quite often, but my first pick is always the Lyman. A good manual will guide you through the basic steps to produce good ammunition and give you an idea of the type of equipment you may want to buy.

Progressive or single stage reloading press? It's hard to make a mistake when loading on a single stage press. Each month at our shoots, someone will have a squib round and have a bullet stuck in the barrel. Most of the time, that person was reloading on a progressive press. If you plan on learning how to load on your own, get a single stage press until you have enough experience to graduate to a progressive. If you insist on getting a progressive as a new reloader, get a manual index progressive such as the RCBS Pro 2000 or the Dillon 550B. The auto index progressives can and will get a new reloader into trouble.

The other items required include dies, powder scale, powder measure, shell holder, loading blocks, and bullet casting and lubing equipment if you decide you want to cast your own bullets. The list can go on and on and you can find yourself buying items you may never need unless you do your research ahead of time. Talk to several experienced reloaders and learn from them. While they may have a preference for certain manufacturer's equipment, they can give you their opinion as to what you should buy. Only then should you purchase your equipment. Be advised, that unless you have a reliable supply of lead available, you will most likely be better served buy buying your bullets from the commercial bullet suppliers.

Reloading your own ammunition is both fun and rewarding so if you are not now reloading, talk to those that do and jump in, the water's fine.

"Red Dead Revolver" Western Video Game edit by Quintana

Wadhams critiques the video game "*Red Dead Revolver*" as a stylish but flawed paean to the western. "*Red Dead Revolver*," available for Xbox and PlayStation 2, is somewhat of a disappointment. The game simply lacks that nebulous addictive quality that makes you forget the sweet passage of time for hours on end despite the pain shooting through your wrists or the stinging in your eyes.

The main character is a wandering vigilante named *Red* who closely resembles *Clint Eastwood*. As a boy, *Red* watched his father die before his eyes at the hands of a renegade general who came to steal the gold his father had just prospected further out West.

Red embarks on a quest for the man who killed his pappy, meeting a bevy of refreshing bit characters along the way, among them an Englishman who came to the United States to show off his shooting skills with the circus only to be taken captive by psychotic clowns.

The soundtrack includes songs lifted straight out of some classic westerns. The sound effects include the "*springle-shingg-shingg*" of spurs, the "*puh-kerchow!*" of a ricochet and the "*klk-bzzzzzzzz*" of a six-shooter's whirling chamber reminding one of just how captivating the *Wild West* can still be.

There are some clever game play innovations, like a slow-motion quick draw system and a fluid mechanic that lets you hide behind almost any structure - from a boulder to an outhouse - and quickly spring out to pop off a few rounds.

At heart, though, the mature-rated game, which retails for \$49.99, is not strong enough to hold these refreshing elements together. Strip away the music, the atmosphere and the attitude, and what remains is a fairly unimaginative action shooter, according to Wadhams. Then again, the venerable game news Web site Gamespot reports that "*Red Dead Revolver*" **is one of the top-selling U.S. console games**.

The Long Range .38-55 by Jonah Stark

The long range side matches each month have become more popular. A look at the cartridges being used is always interesting. Most popular cartridge has been the .45-70, followed by the .30-30. The .38-55 is beginning to show up more often and the .40-65 has also been seen.

CAS is responsible for many of the manufacturers bringing back the old style guns and ammunition. The .32-20, .38-40, .44-40, .45 Colt, .45 Schofield, .40-65, .38-55 and while it never really died, the .45-70, are all more popular than ever.

Some time ago, Two Shot Tex wrote an article entitled Ramblin' On About The .45-70. How about one now on the .38-55?

Marlins and Winchesters are both available as lever actions and several replica 1885 Winchester High Walls are now available for the .38-55. Marlin was making the 336CB in .30-30 also, but dropped it in favor of the .38-55.

The .38-55 was originally known as the .38-55 Ballard and in 1894 was the original cartridge along with the .32-40 in the 1894 Winchester. Original cartridge length for the .38-55 was 2.13", but was later reduced to 2.085". With the coming of smokeless powder, the .38-55 was necked down to .30 and the case shortened to 2.039". When Winchester revived the .38-55, so to speak, as the .375 Winchester, the .30-30 case was shortened to 2.02" and blown out to .375 and the allowable chamber pressure was significantly raised.

While the .38-55 and the .375 Winchester share almost identical dimensions, they are not meant to be interchangeable. While none of the manufacturers would approve and I'm not saying it is safe to do so, some people do shoot the .375 Winchester in a MODERN .38-55 and vice versa. Don't even think about doing it in an 1893 Marlin.

For those that find even the light loads in the .45-70 to be a little too much to handle, the mild recoil of the .38-55, especially in the lever actions, is very welcome.

Groove diameter for the .38-55 in most guns runs .378 to .379. Some of the older guns will run up to as much as .383.

I'll only address lead bullets here. Bullets sized to .379 seem to work very well for most guns. Gas checked bullets can be driven as fast as 1900 fps or so. Plain base bullets generally should be held to about 1500 fps or less to prevent leading. In my own Marlin, my plain base bullets clock 1355 fps. Lead bullets are available from most of the commercial bullet manufacturers. For those who cast their own bullets, moulds are available from RCBS, Lyman, Lee, NEI, LBT & others. For the lever actions, bullets in the 230 to 265 grain weight are correct. For the single shots, bullets as heavy as 330 grains or more are available.

Several powders will work very well in the .38-55. Among these are the 4895's, 4198's, 3031, 5744, 2400, Reloader 7 and Hodgdon's 322. All will give good results depending on the velocity you are trying to achieve.

All major die manufacturers provide .38-55 reloading dies.

So, if you want a mild shooting easy to reload long range cartridge, give the .38-55 a try. It shoots flatter than the .45-70 and doesn't beat you up with recoil.

'Til next time, shoot straight and keep your head down.

TEXICAN RANGER CODE: "SPIRIT OF THE GAME" --- RESPECT --- COURTESY

Texas Lore by Quintana (Source - Wild West Magazine) The shotgun was another popular weapon among the *Texicans*. Admittedly lacking the range of the rifle, it was as accurate as the musket while featuring the advantage of firing multiple projectiles. A 12 gauge shotgun, for example, sported twin barrels, each of which might be loaded with a single .72 caliber ball backed by a load of buckshot pellets. Called "*blue whistlers*" by the *Texicans*, these buckshot clusters could eviscerate or behead a man at close range. When *Texas Ranger Captain Jack Hays* deployed his *Rangers* to guard *Captain Mathew Caldwell's* left flank at *Salado Creek* east of San Antonio, he also incorporated a shotgun armed squad of militiamen into his command in order to saturate with fire the Mexicans' approach along a brush-screened creek bed that emptied into the Salado. When the Mexican attack finally materialized within that narrow defile, the *Texican* scatterguns turned it into a slaughterhouse.

Women & Guns by Pepper Jacq

Ladies, if you are a '*Cowgirl Action Shooter*', its high time you subscribe to *Women & Guns, The World's First Firearms Publication for Women*. In addition to the regular well written articles that are both educational and interesting, the July/August 2004 issue of *Women & Guns* included three articles of special interest to those of us *Cowgirl Shooters*.

Our own **Susan Laws**, *a.k.a. Aimless Annie*, did a write up titled "*Struck By Vintage Lightning*". Annie does an excellent job of relating the facts regarding new production of this classic *1884* original *Colt Lightning* slide-action rifle. The short stock design may be a bit small for your everyday 6 foot 6 Cowboy, but may be perfect for a woman's stature. Annie described the slide hand position as having felt natural and well suited to her short reach. She noted the gun looks fragile, however, it responds to muscle and performs well when stoked with authority.

Katie Ferraro Creigh, *a.k.a. Justice Lilly Kate*, wrote an article titled "*Women Are Home on the Range At Cowboy Action's Premiere Event*". This was a superb write up on *End of Trail* from a woman's perspective. This article represented an excellent form of sharing the heart of our sport with other women interested in firearms and the old west.

Last, but not least, was an article titled "*Why is a Gun Like Red Lace Panties?*" Well, *fellas*, you just have to leave this information to the *ladies*.
